How did you get on with naming and sorting 2d and 3d shapes?

This week we are working on lines of symmetry in 2d shapes. When something is symmetrical one side is a mirror image of the other side. A line of symmetry is the line you can draw to show that both sides are the same. This is a good website to help explain symmetry to an adult at home [Symmetry for adults](#).

Right and Wrong

A dilemma is when a tough choice has to be made and the different choices make you think about what is right and wrong and the impact of your choice on other people.

An example of a dilemma is:

You lose a special present that a family member gave you for your birthday. Do you tell them?

You might feel guilty and want to tell the family member as you know it is important to tell the truth but you also know they might be sad and maybe cross that you have lost the present.

Another example is:

You see your friend cheating on a maths test. What do you do?

You know it is wrong to cheat, but you also like your friend. You might want to tell the teacher but you don't want to fall out with your friend. You also think they might be cheating because they find maths difficult.
